- All meetings will be in a room (<http://bbb-test.gwdg.de/b/chr-yu3-mch>) own by Christian Jäh, dedicated to the seminar. The **BigBlueButton** instance is hosted by the GWDG at the GAUG and complies with German privacy policies.
- You should of course have a microphone as to be able to ask questions. In principal that can also be done in the chat but on occasion it will simply be more efficient to have the possibility to speak. It would be nice (though is by no means necessary) if a camera were available so that we could see each other at least at the beginning of the meeting. Once the talk commences, the cameras may be switched off to conserve bandwidth.
- The person giving the talk is supposed to come to the Institute (Tue. 16:00-18:00, HS6) and use the local equipment (as SMARTPodium and Chalk board streaming) to deliver the talk online. The presence is also necessary for the talk to count as an examination. Otherwise you may give a talk but it may not count towards your degree.
- It will be possible to give a chalk board talk but it might be advisable to use the provided templates and prepare some slides which then can be augmented via screensharing on the provided SMART Notebook software or other applications as Microsoft's OneNote.
I think it is easiest to write on the SMARTPodium either the complete talk or annotations to prepared slides. It will be beneficial to keep everything as simple as possible with regards to technology.
